RN to BSN Bridge

Evaluation Summary & Recommendation – December 2018

Proposal and Recommendation

The Growth and Development team recommends to Senior Management that the College continue development of a Registered Nursing to Bachelor of Science in Nursing bridge program (RN to BSN Bridge, or BSN Bridge), to be offered to students following initial accreditation by WASC Senior. This recommendation follows years of related course and program development work, and is most recently the result of a detailed evaluation of the proposed RN to BSN Bridge as it relates to College strategy.

Strategic Evaluation

Creation of the proposed RN to BSN Bridge program was considered and evaluated through the lens of SJVC's strategic objectives:

Increase Campus & Program Offerings

The proposed program would expand the programs offered by the College, while substantially leveraging its developed core competencies in nursing education. The program, to be offered online, would also extend the College's nursing education beyond the Central Valley and Southern California markets currently served. This program creation would also add a new source of revenue, contributing to financial stability and supporting improvement in College operations across all campuses and programs.

Enroll Capable Applicants

Detailed analysis of current supply and demand for nursing education in RN to BSN Bridge programs strongly indicates an opportunity for the College to build a successful program with a mature census of roughly 100 students, and between 80 and 100 graduates per year. This would place the SJVC RN to BSN Bridge program as a relatively small, but regionally important provider of continuing nursing education.

The number of Registered Nurses completing BS Bridge programs each year is substantial, and has continued to increase over the last three years (Appendix A). The three-year compounded annual growth rate (CAGR) for national completions in online programs is greater than 10%. In 2016, more than 80,000 nurses completed an online BSN program nationally. Twelve (12) institutions had more than 1,000 graduates, 20 institutions had between 500 and 1,000, 149 institutions had between 100 and 500, and another 155 had fewer than 100 graduates.

SJVC Registered Nursing program graduates are one key stakeholder group that would be well served by the proposed SJVC RN to BSN Bridge program. The College has produced nearly 700 RN graduates in the last ten years (Appendix B), the majority of whom have gone on to work in local California markets near an SJVC campus. Seventy (70%) of the first 87 starts in the College's new Registered Respiratory Therapist to Bachelor of Science in Respiratory Therapy bridge program (RRT to BSRT Bridge) are SJVC RRT graduates.

Analysis of internet search traffic for BSN Bridge programs, both in current SJVC markets and nationally, also support the proposed start budgets. Program and credential specific keywords offer more than 50,000 monthly impressions in California, and more than 500,000 nationally, with expected net inquiries of 70 and 850 respectively (Appendix C). The College would plan to fully leverage the California search demand, but

only selectively pursue the high volume of national traffic. As with its early success in the RRT to BSRT Bridge program, the College would also use direct marketing to Registered Nurses whose highest educational attainment is an AS Degree (95,000 in CA; 660,000 nationally).

Achieve Course Success

The College reasonably expects strong outcomes for course success in the proposed RN to BSN Bridge program, given the nature and capability of the student population served. All program students will have successfully completed a rigorous Registered Nursing program at the AS Degree level, and successfully passed relevant licensure exams to work as a Registered Nurse. The exceptional course success rates (94% to date) for similarly situated students in the RRT to BSRT Bridge program support this expectation.

The multitude of Online BSN Bridge programs also presents the opportunity to recruit faculty with substantial, specific experience in course design and instruction with proven best practices.

Ensure Career Readiness

As noted, all students in the proposed program will be licensed Registered Nurses, with the overwhelming majority pursuing further education to advance an already established career as a nursing professional.

Achieve Academic Success

As noted, the College reasonably expects strong graduation rates based on the student population served. The College will also leverage its array of services provided for online students. The program will not lead to any additional professional licensure beyond the pre-requisite Registered Nursing credential.

Achieve Professional Success

The majority of students in the proposed program will be currently working in the field of nursing. The current standards and definitions for graduate placement under the College's California state approval agency require that graduates gain either a positional promotion or an increase in pay, or that completion of the program was required for continued employment in a current position.

The Bureau of Labor and Statistics (BLS) reports a variety of career advancement opportunities for Registered Nurses who complete a BS Bridge program (https://www.bls.gov/ooh/healthcare/registered-nurses.htm#tab-1). The substantial value of continuing education in the field of nursing is also self-evident in the substantial and growing number of nurses who complete BSN Bridge programs every year.

The College reasonably expects low Cohort Default Rates (CDR) for program graduates. Graduates of the current Registered Nursing program had a CDR of less than 2% for both 2014 and 2015.

Increase SJVC Presence

Creating the proposed program will likely result in a modest increase of roughly 100 students to the total College census, with approximately \$1.6M in annual revenue (Appendix D).

Ensure Financial Stability

The proposed BSN Bridge program is projected to generate a total of \$2.6M in revenue within the first 24 months. The program will have positive cash flow by month three, will first achieve return on investment in month six (inclusive of all start-up costs), and is projected to have an ongoing net margin of just over 50% before corporate expenses and taxes.

Operational Considerations

Administrative Leadership

The College will leverage the substantial expertise of current administrative leadership in its nursing education programs for the proposed BSN Bridge program. The organizational structure of leadership (e.g. new lead faculty positions), division of labor, and number of staff may change as the program grows to scale and in response to continuing improvement for existing programs.

Curriculum Development

The College has worked on curriculum for the proposed program for a number of years, and has devoted substantial resources in recent months to complete the structure and content of the BSN Bridge. The Instructional Design team for online courses is currently working closely with content experts drawn from faculty in the Registered Nursing program.

Accreditation and Approvals

The College would need to achieve Initial Accreditation status from WASC Senior in order to offer the proposed BSN Bridge program, as it is limited to a single Bachelor level offering under current accreditation by WASC Junior. The College would also require approvals from the California BPPE and USDE, which would follow as a matter of course from approval by WASC Senior.

Distributed Enrollment Services

The College would plan to leverage the experience, nursing industry expertise, and personal connections of admissions staff on the Visalia and Ontario campuses to serve prospective students in the proposed BSN Bridge program. This distributed service model would mirror the effective practice in place for the BSRT Bridge program. The volume of inquiries and enrollments may require scaling of admissions staff in the designated campuses.

RDH to BSDH Bridge

Evaluation Summary & Recommendation – December 2018

Proposal and Recommendation

The Growth and Development team recommends to Senior Management that the College continue development of a Registered Dental Hygiene to Bachelor of Science in Dental Hygiene bridge program (RDH to BSDH Bridge, or BSDH Bridge), to be offered to students following initial accreditation by WASC Senior. This recommendation follows related course and program development work, and is the result of a detailed evaluation of the proposed RDH to BSDH Bridge as it relates to College strategy.

Strategic Evaluation

Creation of the proposed BSDH Bridge program was considered and evaluated through the lens of SJVC's strategic objectives:

Increase Campus & Program Offerings

The proposed program would expand the programs offered by the College, while substantially leveraging its developed core competencies in dental hygiene education. The program, to be offered online, would also extend the College's dental hygiene education beyond the Central Valley and Southern California markets currently served. This program creation would also add a new source of revenue, contributing to financial stability and supporting improvement in College operations across all campuses and programs.

Enroll Capable Applicants

Detailed analysis of current supply and demand for dental hygiene education at the Bachelors degree level indicates an opportunity for the College to build a successful program with a mature census of roughly 50 students, and between 40 and 50 graduates per year. This would place the SJVC RDH to BSDH Bridge program in the top third of all such programs offered nationally.

Relatively few Dental Hygienists go on to complete a Bachelors degree in the field. From 2014 through 2016, there were nearly 6,000 graduates per year from AS Degree programs nationally, and about 2,000 per year from BS Degree programs (Appendix A). Of the 2,000 BS Degree graduates, an average of 730 were designated as distance education (mostly bridge or related degree completion programs).

Those general proportions hold for the geographic regions served by all campuses of SJVC. In those markets, there were about 1,000 AS Degree graduates per year, and 270 BS Degree graduates, with an average of 70 of those in online bridge programs. There has been no significant growth for any credential level or modality in dental hygiene education over that three-year period.

The College would leverage its history and demonstrated performance in dental hygiene education to launch the proposed program. SJVC has produced more than 1,300 graduates since the program was first introduced on the Visalia campus more than 20 years ago, including more than 560 graduates from three campuses since 2010 (Appendix B).

Considering the period 2014 through 2016, SJVC produced roughly 15% of all Dental Hygiene graduates at the AS Degree level in California. The California Community College System in total produced about 1,400 graduates over that period, while SJVC and two other peer institutions had about 500 graduates each.

This substantial graduate pool for the College will be fundamental to the proposed program's early success, mirroring recent experience with the new Registered Respiratory Therapist to Bachelor of Science in Respiratory Therapy bridge program (RRT to BSRT Bridge). Seventy (70%) of the first 87 starts in the College's RRT to BSRT Bridge are SJVC RRT graduates.

Analysis of internet search traffic for BSDH Bridge programs, both in current SJVC markets and nationally, demonstrates substantial interest in continuing education for Registered Dental Hygienists. Program and credential specific keywords offer more than 6,000 monthly impressions in California, and more than 10,000 nationally, with expected net inquiries of 25 and 50 respectively (Appendix C). The relative strength of interest in BSDH programs in California compared to the national totals is further indication of the College's strong competitive position for the proposed program. As with its early success in the RRT to BSRT Bridge program, the College would also use direct marketing to currently Registered Dental Hygienists whose highest educational attainment is an AS Degree (4,000 in CA; 18,000 nationally).

Achieve Course Success

The College reasonably expects strong outcomes for course success in the proposed BSDH Bridge program, given the nature and capability of the student population served. All program students will have successfully completed a rigorous Dental Hygiene program at the AS Degree level, and successfully passed relevant licensure exams to work as a Registered Dental Hygienist. The exceptional course success rates (94% to date) for similarly situated students in the RRT to BSRT Bridge program support this expectation.

Ensure Career Readiness

As noted, all students in the proposed program will be licensed Registered Dental Hygienists, with the overwhelming majority pursuing further education to advance an already established career working in the field.

Achieve Academic Success

The College reasonably expects strong graduation rates based on the student population served. The College will also leverage its array of services provided for online students. The program will not lead to any additional professional licensure beyond the pre-requisite Registered Dental Hygienist credential.

Achieve Professional Success

The majority of students in the proposed program will be currently working in the field. The current standards and definitions for graduate placement under the College's California state approval agency require that graduates gain either a positional promotion or an increase in pay, or that completion of the program was required for continued employment in a current position.

The Bureau of Labor and Statistics (BLS) reports a variety of career advancement opportunities for Dental Hygienists who complete a BS Bridge program (https://www.bls.gov/ooh/healthcare/dental-hygienists.htm#tab-1). Examples include transitioning from work in a typical dental office to positions in "research, teaching, or clinical practice in public or health school programs."

The College reasonably expects low Cohort Default Rates (CDR) for program graduates. Graduates of the current Dental Hygiene program had a CDR of less than 1% for both 2014 and 2015.

<u>Increase SJVC Presence</u>

Creating the proposed program will likely result in a modest increase of roughly 50 students to the total College census, with approximately \$750K in annual revenue (Appendix D).

Ensure Financial Stability

The proposed BSDH Bridge program is projected to generate a total of \$1.2M in revenue within the first 24 months. The program will have positive cash flow by month three, will first achieve return on investment in month nine (inclusive of all start-up costs), and is projected to have an ongoing net margin of just over 40% before corporate expenses and taxes.

Operational Considerations

Administrative Leadership

The College will leverage the substantial expertise of current administrative leadership in its Dental Hygiene education programs for the proposed BSDH Bridge program. The organizational structure of leadership (e.g. new lead faculty positions), division of labor, and number of staff may change as the program grows to scale and in response to continuing improvement for existing programs.

Curriculum Development

The College has worked on curriculum for the proposed program for a number of years, and has devoted substantial resources in recent months to complete the structure and content of the BSDH Bridge. The Instructional Design team for online courses is currently working closely with content experts drawn from faculty in the Dental Hygiene program.

Accreditation and Approvals

The College would need to achieve Initial Accreditation status from WASC Senior in order to offer the proposed BSN Bridge program, as it is limited to a single Bachelor level offering under current accreditation by WASC Junior. The College would also require approvals from the California BPPE and USDE, which would follow as a matter of course from approval by WASC Senior.

Distributed Enrollment Services

The College would plan to leverage the experience, nursing industry expertise, and personal connections of admissions staff on the Visalia and Ontario campuses to serve prospective students in the proposed BSDH Bridge program. This distributed service model would mirror the effective practice in place for the BSRT Bridge program. The volume of inquiries and enrollments may require scaling of admissions staff in the designated campuses.

The Growth and Development team recommends to Senior Management that the College continue development of a Bachelor of Science in Health Care Management degree completion program (BSHCM Program), to be offered to students following initial accreditation by WASC Senior. This recommendation follows related course and program development work, and is the result of a detailed evaluation of the proposed BSHCM Program as it relates to College strategy.

Strategic Evaluation

Creation of the proposed BSHCM Program was considered and evaluated through the lens of SJVC's strategic objectives:

Increase Campus & Program Offerings

The proposed program would expand the programs offered by the College, while substantially leveraging its developed core competencies in administrative health care education. This program creation would add a new source of revenue, contributing to financial stability and supporting improvement in College operations across all campuses and programs.

Enroll Capable Applicants

Detailed analysis of current supply and demand for Bachelors level education in health care management indicates an opportunity for the College to build a successful program with a mature census of roughly 60 students, and between 40 and 60 graduates per year. This would place the SJVC BSHCM Program as a mid-sized, and regionally important provider of health care management education.

The number of students completing Bachelors level programs in health care management each year is substantial, and has continued to increase over the last three years (Appendix A). The three-year compounded annual growth rate (CAGR) for national completions in online BSHCM programs is 15%. In 2016, more than 7,000 students completed an online BSHCM program nationally. Two institutions had more than 500 graduates, 15 institutions had between 100 and 500, and another 111 had fewer than 100 graduates.

SJVC graduates from related programs at the AS Degree level (Medical Office Administration, Health Care Administration, Administrative Health Care Management, and Medical Billing and Coding) are one key stakeholder group that would be well served by the proposed BSHCM Program. The College has produced more than 2,000 graduates from these related programs since 2010, and more than 5,600 over the last thirty years (Appendix B). The majority of those AS Degree program graduates have gone on to work in local California markets near an SJVC campus.

Analysis of internet search traffic for BSHCM programs, both in current SJVC markets and nationally, also support the proposed start budgets. Program and credential specific keywords offer more than 2,700 monthly impressions in California, and more than 21,000 nationally, with expected net inquiries of 5 and 30 respectively (Appendix C). The College would plan to fully leverage both the California and national search

demand. The College would also use direct marketing channels to reach past graduates from related programs.

Achieve Course Success

The College expects strong outcomes for course success in the proposed BSHCM Program, given the nature and capability of the student population served. All program students will have successfully completed an AS Degree level program in health care administration or other allied health care field.

The College expects most students, given the nature of the proposed degree completion program, will be pursuing further education to advance an existing career in the field.

As noted, the College reasonably expects strong graduation rates based on the student population served. The College will also leverage its array of services provided for online students. The program will not lead directly to any specific professional licensure exams.

Achieve Professional Success

The majority of students in the proposed program will be currently working in the field. The current standards and definitions for graduate placement under the College's California state approval agency require that graduates gain either a positional promotion or an increase in pay, or that completion of the program was required for continued employment in a current position.

The Bureau of Labor and Statistics (BLS) reports a variety of career and advancement opportunities for Medical and Health Services Managers who have earned a Bachelors degree (https://www.bls.gov/ooh/Management/Medical-and-health-services-managers.htm). The substantial value of continuing education in the field of health care management is also self-evident in the substantial and growing number of students who complete such programs each year.

The College expects low Cohort Default Rates (CDR) for program graduates, given the higher level academic credential and established career history for the majority of graduates.

<u>Increase SJVC Presence</u>

Creating the proposed program will likely result in a modest increase of roughly 60 students to the total College census, with approximately \$1M in annual revenue (Appendix D).

Ensure Financial Stability

The proposed BSHCM Program is projected to generate a total of \$1.8M in revenue within the first 24 months. The program will have positive cash flow by month three, will first achieve return on investment in month six (inclusive of all start-up costs), and is projected to have an ongoing net margin of just over 50% before corporate expenses and taxes.

Operational Considerations
